Developing leaders in partnership with Wellington College

Developing future leaders

Future Foundations (FF) has worked in partnership with Wellington College on the following programmes:

- A two-day leadership training programme for 150 Wellington College Lower Sixth Students;
- A four-day community leadership residential programme for 160 disadvantaged young people, funded by the DCSF, and delivered in partnership with Changemakers;
- Launched a service-leadership programme challenging 30 fifth form and lower sixth students to carry out community projects;

They aim to provide a unique opportunity in the breadth and depth of education they offer, which goes beyond academic success into every sphere of life. Sixth Form Leadership Training

In partnership with Wellington College, FF delivered training to help 150 Wellington College Lower Sixth students to experience leading a team, develop leadership skills for life, commit to leading a community project and review the effectiveness of their teamwork and leadership.

The students feedback was extremely positive with many reporting back learning new ideas about leadership. For example, one student noted *'when in a group, you need to listen to everyone, as every opinion is valid'*.

Leadership Residential

FF supported Changemakers in the delivery of 'The Youth of Today' (TYOT) Summer Residential, hosted by Wellington College. This was a leadership training residential programme for 160 disadvantaged young people from 10 regions of England. The programme was designed and delivered by over 50 FF coaches, facilitators and operations assistants.

TYOT was created to help young people make a positive difference to society. It is funded and supported by the DCSF and Local Government. It is managed by a range of leading organisations including The National Youth Agency (NYA), Changemakers, The Young Foundation, UK Youth Parliament, British Youth Council, the Prince's Trust and the Citizenship Foundation.

The Wellington Social Apprentice

The aim of "The Social Apprentice" programme was to help Fifth Form and Lower Sixth Wellington College students to develop their skills, talents and aspirations by challenging them to learn how to lead themselves and others.

FF delivered a multi-day programme which challenged the students to work in teams to identify a need in the community (local, national or international), then run a project to meet that need which matches their passions, talents and skills.

Heads of School Conference

FF delivered training on how to lead and motivate others to 150 Head Boys and Head Girls from 50 schools at the 4th annual Wellington College Heads of School conference. This programme is a student led initiative managed by the prefects of Wellington College.
